PARISH REGISTRATION AND SACRAMENTS

Those seeking to receive the Sacraments of Baptism, First Holy Communion, Confirmation, and Matrimony **must be registered members** for **at least six months** prior to reception of these Sacraments. You must be a registered member of the parish to ask for Godparent or Sponsor's form of eligibility. **To register, please email Kyle Hall at kyle.hall@charlestondiocese.org**, or you can also <u>register online</u> – scan the QR code below by opening your camera app.



Infant Baptism Class for Parents

Parents must be registered and active member of St. Anthony's. Class is offered on the third Thursday of every month. Pre- registration is required. Please call the office to pre-register. Baptisms are not celebrated during the Season of Lent.

First Holy Communion

Preparation begins in the first grade and continues into second grade for a total of two years of preparation. Registration for Religious Education classes takes place in August. The first day of class is the third or fourth week in August.

Confirmation

Preparation begins in the eighth grade and continues into ninth grade for a total of two years of preparation. Registration for Religious Education classes takes place in August. The first day of class is the third or fourth week of August. Adults who have not been confirmed and would like to receive the Sacrament are asked to contact the parish office.

Marriage

You must be registered and active member at least six months prior to preparation of the Sacrament. Couples should call the parish office and speak to the priest/ Deacon for pre-nuptial inquiries. Then the couple will begin formal marriage preparations at least six months prior to the wedding date.

Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA)

This is a process through which non-baptized adults known as catechumens or baptized adults who wish to convert from other faith traditions enter in communion with the Catholic Church. Classes begins in September. If you wish to become a Catholic, please call the parish office.

PRAYER

FROM THE DESK OF OUR PASTORAL ADMINISTRATOR

It's 2 AM. You're staring at the ceiling, your mind spinning—tomorrow's meeting, your child's health, your career, your retirement, a diagnosis, a broken relationship. The worries feel endless and overwhelming. The weight presses on your chest, stealing your breath. Where do you turn when the worries won't stop? Do you bring it to God in prayer? And if you do, what does that prayer look like?

Is it a desperate plea, a rushed, "God, just fix this"? Or could it be something deeper—something grounding, healing, and real?

Prayer is more than a quick request, it's a lifeline. It connects you to God who knows you and loves you intimately. It's an open invitation to step into His presence, where His love heals, His peace calms, and His grace transforms you from the inside out.

Jesus showed us that prayer is more than just asking for help (though He's always ready to hear those prayers too). It's about letting Him into your heart, allowing Him to guide your thoughts and shape who you're becoming. Prayer isn't a "thing to do"; it's a way to live.

It's not a chore or a formula. St. Thérèse of Lisieux described prayer as "a surge of the heart; it is a simple look turned toward heaven, it is a cry of recognition and of love, embracing both trial and joy." Her words remind us that prayer doesn't have to be complicated. It's about the heart—about simply turning to God with love, no matter what you're facing.

Think of the story of Mary and Martha. While Martha was rushing around, overwhelmed with tasks, Mary chose to sit at Jesus' feet and simply be with Him. Jesus gently reminded Martha, "You're worried about so many things, but only one thing matters. Mary has chosen the better part." What was the better part? Just being with Him. Mary understood something we often forget—time with Jesus brings a peace that busyness never can.

Even the Lord's Prayer, taught by Jesus, is more than words we memorize. It's a guide for how to live in trust, surrender, and love:

- 'Our Father' reminds us we belong to God and are part of a greater family.
- · 'Give us this day our daily bread' teaches daily dependence—not just for physical needs but for spiritual nourishment: Jesus Himself.
- 'Your kingdom come, your will be done' invites us to surrender our plans and trust His timing, even when life feels uncertain.
- 'Forgive us... as we forgive others' challenges us to release grudges and invite healing and community through mercy.

Prayer isn't just talking—it's listening too. Even Jesus stepped away to quiet places to pray and connect with the Father. If He needed that connection, how much more do we? Think of prayer like charging your phone—without plugging into the source, you'll run out of energy. Prayer fills you with God's love and strength, anchoring you when the storms of life rage.

And here's the best part: prayer isn't about having the perfect words. It's not about saying all the right things or doing it "the right way." God doesn't want a polished speech—He wants you. Just as you are.

Prayer is not just about us; it's about building our relationship with God and with others. Jesus reminded us of this in the story of the persistent neighbor knocking on the door at midnight for bread. Even though the neighbor was reluctant at first, they eventually got up and helped. Why? Because prayer is rooted in love and connection—it's about living with open hearts and hands, reflecting God's generosity.

So, let prayer become more than a task. Let it become part of who you are. Whisper, "Lord, teach me to pray." Ask for the Holy Spirit to guide you. Through the Spirit, you can cry out, "Abba, Father," and step into a deeper relationship with the One who loves you most.

Will you meet Him in prayer? Right now, wherever you are, speak His name. He's already there, ready to bring peace to your chaos, hope to your struggle, and love to your heart. Watch how His presence transforms everything. Amen.

The conference is named after Archbishop James P Lyke, OFM the second of three black archbishops in US history. Those attending the conference were treated to classes focusing on preserving black culture in the liturgy of traditionally African American Catholic churches. The conference had a large focus on music as it is a primary way culture is expressed within the liturgy. Many classes were taught by familiar names seen in our Lead Me, Guide Me hymnal such as composers Roger Holland and Aaron Mathews. Other classes included sessions on the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, youth evangelization, how we can be pilgrims of hope, and bringing comfort and hope to families in bereavement. Every session was inspirational.

Food Pantry Update

Our Food Pantry continues to grow and **serve our neighbors each week**, with anywhere from **160 to 190 bags distributed regularly**. We are grateful to welcome new clients while continuing to support many familiar faces.

As the needs of our community increase, so do our basic supply needs. **Items we are especially in need of include:**

- Vienna sausage
- Peanut butter crackers
- Fruit cups
- Bottled water

For our unhoused neighbors, we aim to provide ready-to-eat, easy-to-carry items such as:

- Instant grits or oatmeal
- Pop-Tarts or protein bars
- Pop-top cans of meat or SpaghettiOs
- Ramen noodles

We also collect personal hygiene items, which we prepare in ziplock bags to hand out. Thanks to available mobile shower facilities, these hygiene kits are a much-needed resource.

Each month, **families of 3 or more can request a family box once a month for staples**, including canned vegetables, pasta and sauce, rice, cereal, dried beans, peanut butter and jelly, and more.

Looking ahead, we are excited to host a neighborhood cookout at the end of the summer—a joyful tradition that is always well attended!

Principal Purview

What Makes a School Truly Catholic? Part 2: The Human Right to Education

The Church teaches that every human person, by virtue of their dignity, has the right to an education. Gravissimum Educationis (§1) affirms:

"All men of every race, condition and age, since they enjoy the dignity of a human being, have an inalienable right to an education. For education is, in a very special way, the means of enabling man to develop as a human being."

This powerful statement points to a central truth of our faith: education is not merely a privilege or a tool for social advancement, but a human right rooted in the very nature of the person. Because we are rational and spiritual beings made in God's image, we are capable of—and called to—growth in knowledge, wisdom, and virtue.

Catholic education embraces this full vision of the human person. We believe that children are not passive recipients of information, but active participants in their own formation—formed not only intellectually, but morally, spiritually, and culturally.

In our school, this means we aim not simply to teach facts, but to cultivate souls—to help each child become the person God created them to be. Education, rightly understood, is a work of love and justice.

As we continue this series, let us keep in mind: to educate is to serve the whole person—body, mind, and soul—with the dignity that comes from being a child of God.
