PARISH REGISTRATION AND SACRAMENTS

Those seeking to receive the Sacraments of Baptism, First Holy Communion, Confirmation, and Matrimony **must be registered members** for **at least six months** prior to reception of these Sacraments. You must be a registered member of the parish to ask for Godparent or Sponsor's form of eligibility. **To register, please email Kyle Hall at kyle.hall@charlestondiocese.org**, or you can also <u>register online</u> – scan the QR code below by opening your camera app.



Infant Baptism Class for Parents

Parents must be registered and active member of St. Anthony's. Class is offered on the third Thursday of every month. Pre- registration is required. Please call the office to pre-register. Baptisms are not celebrated during the Season of Lent.

First Holy Communion

Preparation begins in the first grade and continues into second grade for a total of two years of preparation. Registration for Religious Education classes takes place in August. The first day of class is the third or fourth week in August.

Confirmation

Preparation begins in the eighth grade and continues into ninth grade for a total of two years of preparation. Registration for Religious Education classes takes place in August. The first day of class is the third or fourth week of August. Adults who have not been confirmed and would like to receive the Sacrament are asked to contact the parish office.

Marriage

You must be registered and active member at least six months prior to preparation of the Sacrament. Couples should call the parish office and speak to the priest/ Deacon for pre-nuptial inquiries. Then the couple will begin formal marriage preparations at least six months prior to the wedding date.

Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA)

This is a process through which non-baptized adults known as catechumens or baptized adults who wish to convert from other faith traditions enter in communion with the Catholic Church. Classes begins in September. If you wish to become a Catholic, please call the parish office.

Throne of Mercy, Kingdom of Love: Following the King of the Cross

What does it mean to call Christ our King? To answer this, the Gospel for the Feast of Christ the King takes us to an unlikely place—Golgotha, "the place of the skull," the hill of the cross. Here, in the shadow of suffering, humiliation, and love, Jesus redefines kingship. His throne is not gold but wood; His crown not jewels but thorns. This is kingship as the world has never seen it before, the kind that transforms hearts forever. Interestingly, Church Fathers like Origen and St. Jerome suggest that Adam's skull was buried at the very site of Christ's cross. In this way, the blood of Jesus, poured out on the cross, is seen as flowing down to redeem Adam and all of humanity from the stain of original sin. It is a striking image: the new Adam restoring what was broken by the first.

St. Luke's account challenges our understanding of power and glory. There is no golden crown, only thorns; no royal robe, only torn flesh; no grand procession, only jeering crowds. Yet, in this paradox lies the truth of Christ's kingship: glory through sacrifice, power through mercy. The sign above His broken body—"King of the Jews"—meant as mockery, declares an eternal truth. His reign isn't marked by domination or force, but by redemption and self-giving love.

As we celebrate Jesus as King of the Universe, the title invites us to consider a deeply personal question: Who or what truly rules our hearts? It's easy to call Christ our King, but harder to live as though He is. How often do we let ambition, possessions, or pride take His place? This feast invites us to reflect: What would our lives look like if we let Christ's love and mercy guide us? How would the world change if we lived under His reign?

Jesus' kingship turns everything we know about power upside down, challenging not just the rulers of His time, but the priorities in our own hearts today. At Golgotha, the religious leaders and soldiers couldn't understand a Messiah who embraced suffering. To them, power meant avoiding the cross, not embracing it. But Jesus shows us a different way. True power, He teaches, is found not in conquering, but in surrendering; not in taking, but in giving. His reign is one of radical love—a love that forgives, heals, and transforms. Even in His final moments, He offers mercy, promising paradise to the criminal beside Him. His kingship doesn't avoid suffering—it redeems it. His power isn't about saving Himself but saving others.

This love defined Jesus' whole life. He ate with outcasts, forgave sinners, and welcomed the forgotten. From His first proclamation of good news to the poor to His final breath on the cross, He revealed a kingdom like no other—a kingdom for everyone, especially the least expected. His kingship asks us to reflect: What does it mean to follow a King whose throne is a cross? St. Augustine reminds us, "If you would reign with Him, deny yourself as He denied Himself." To follow Christ is to embrace His self-giving love and surrender to God's will.

As we end the liturgical year, this feast asks us what it means to live under Christ's reign. Salvation isn't just about the afterlife; it's about a life here and now, transformed by His love and mercy. Building His kingdom requires courage and humility. It asks us to let go of the "false kings" we cling to—our pride, ambitions, and comforts—and let Christ rule our hearts. Paradoxically, in surrendering to His reign, we find true freedom and joy.

Imagine the change if Christ truly reigned in our lives. What would it look like to dethrone the idols of power and self-interest and let love and mercy guide every choice? The transformation would ripple outward—not just in us, but in our families, communities, and the world. When we look to the cross, we don't see defeat; we see victory. Not just a suffering man, but a King whose power is love.

So, who truly rules your heart? What would change if Christ took His rightful place as King of your life? Let's crown Him today—not with words alone, but with lives transformed by His mercy and love. For when we follow the King of the Cross, everything changes. Amen



Revitalizing Our Playground: Safe Spaces for Joyful Play

Our school playground is like a time capsule, filled with memories of childhood. But sadly, some of the playground equipment is old and broken, making it unsafe for kids to play. We're committed to creating a space where students can explore God's creation through active, imaginative play—essential for their physical, social, and spiritual development.

- Timeline: Demolition begins this winter, with construction completing in spring 2026.

Updating Our STEM Curriculum: Igniting Wonder in God's World

In line with our mission to form faithful innovators, we're updating our STEM program to equip students with tools for scientific inquiry and mathematical reasoning—skills that reveal the beauty and order of creation. This renewal focuses on hands-on learning that aligns with Catholic values of wonder, collaboration, and ethical problem-solving.

- Key Components:
 - FOSS Next Generation Science Curriculum (Grades K-5): Developed by the Lawrence Hall of Science at UC Berkeley, this research-based program engages students in authentic scientific practices. It leverages natural wonder for observable phenomena, aligned with Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). Students won't just learn about science—they'll do science: observing, testing ideas, and applying knowledge to real-world problems. As the FOSS philosophy states, "Science is a discovery activity, a process for producing new knowledge," making it accessible and equitable for every child. Lessons use local, relevant phenomena to build deeper understanding of the natural and designed worlds, bridging content knowledge with active participation.

o Updated Mathematics Curriculum and Professional Development:

- We're adopting a new math framework paired with training from The Number Lab, an organization dedicated to
 ending "impoverished math experiences" through innovative, practice-based learning. This includes a three-day
 [Co]Lab seminar at Long-View Micro School, where teachers will:
 - Strengthen mathematical reasoning and problem-solving.
 - Build a math-rich classroom culture through collaboration.
 - Explore Universal Design for Learning (UDL) to support diverse learners.
 - Foster critical thinking, communication, and creativity—embracing math as a "generative perspective" that promotes growth mindsets.
 - This empowers teachers to create positive math experiences, helping students see numbers as a reflection of divine order.
- Timeline: Professional development and curriculum introduction in early summer 2026, with full classroom
 implementation starting fall 2026.
- Funding Goal: \$25,000 to jumpstart this 18-month renewal in mathematics and natural science.

By supporting STEM at St. Anthony, you're helping students come to know and reverence the Creator through His creation, preparing them to be stewards of innovation in a world that needs faithful, free, and joyful leaders.
