

From the Pastor's Desk

Parish Update

My dear sisters and brothers in Christ, as our parish continues to grow in mission, we are making some staff and office changes so that we can serve people more faithfully and effectively. In the coming weeks, we will be restructuring roles, redistributing responsibilities, and realigning positions to better support our mission and strengthen how we serve our community.

This reorganization is part of the broader renewal of our parish as we embrace the mission and vision God is calling us to. We began this renewal journey through Divine Renovation, and it continues to be strengthened by the leadership coaching we have completed and the Alpha coaching now underway.

Renewal of this kind often begins with a small group of leaders and then gradually extends outward—shaping our teams, our ministries, and ultimately the life of the whole parish—so that everything we do is more intentionally focused on making disciples, welcoming others, and helping people encounter Jesus and grow in faith. In that spirit, I encourage every group in the parish to begin each meeting or practice with the Missional Prayer, placing our plans and our ministry intentionally in the Lord's hands.

Strengthening Our Parish Through Small Groups

As part of our Via Fidelis journey, the focus for the month of March is Small Groups. I encourage parishioners to consider forming small groups for prayer, fellowship, and faith formation as a way to grow together in our life with Christ and strengthen our parish community.

To support this effort, the White House (327 Gower St.), located on our parish campus behind the school parking lot, is available as a space for small groups to gather. If your group would like to reserve this space, please contact Johnny Payne to schedule a time.

I look forward to seeing our parish continue to grow in faith and community through these small gatherings.

FR. EMERSON'S WEEKEND REFLECTION

New Creation, One Wound at a Time

Last Sunday, Jesus revealed himself as the living water. He is the One who meets the deepest thirst of the human heart: the thirst for meaning, belonging, forgiveness, hope. This Sunday, He appears as the light of the world. And honestly, what good is water if you're still stumbling around in the dark? Or light, if you're still parched? These two images, water and light, aren't separate or competing. They're like two warm hands of the same embrace, revealing who Jesus truly is. He satisfies our longing. He steps into our darkness. He reaches for us when we're lost, wandering, or weary.

From Israel stumbling through the desert to the radiant city of Revelation 21, God has been promising the same gifts: water that is free and life-giving, and a light that no night can overcome. All of it fulfilled in Christ, the Lamb who is our Light.

And with that in mind, we turn to the story of the man born blind. Here, Jesus isn't simply performing a miracle. He's unveiling His identity. He embodies the truth of His words: "I am the light of the world." And the timing matters. This moment unfolds during the Feast of Tabernacles, when Israel remembered God's tenderness in the wilderness: water flowing from a rock, a pillar of fire leading them through the night. Now Jesus stands in their midst and says: "Those signs were pointing to Me. I am the true water. I am the true light."

Even the way He heals is rich with meaning. Jesus bends down, mixes dust with His own saliva, and places it gently on the man's eyes. The gesture echoes the creation of Adam from the dust. Isn't it striking? God heals through something ordinary, messy, unexpected. This isn't just healing. This is new creation. The same God who said, "Let there be light," now whispers that same light into one human wound, one human story at a time.

And of course, this story isn't just about the blind man. It's about us. We, too, know what it's like to walk in darkness. The darkness of confusion, grief, resentment, addiction, sin, or that heavy fog that settles over the soul when life feels too much.

And the darkness isn't only within us. It's also around us: division, injustice, indifference, a culture that forgets human dignity. These are forms of blindness too. And perhaps most painful of all? Not the kind we cannot help, but the kind we choose. How often do we turn away from what is real, resist what is true, or ignore what is sacred in others, in ourselves, in God?

Yet the Gospel gives us hope. Jesus comes to us long before we know how to reach for Him. He sees us before we even know where to look. He touches us. He leads us into His light. Notice the progression in the man born blind: first Jesus is simply "the man," then "a prophet," and finally, encountering Him face to face, he declares, "Lord, I believe." Isn't that our story too? We grow step by step. Question by question. Grace by grace. Healing becomes a journey, not an event.

Even Saint Paul lived this paradox. When Christ appeared to him, Paul didn't jump up shouting, "I get it now!" No. He was struck blind. For three days he sat in darkness. And years later, he still admitted, "We see dimly." If Paul only saw dimly, what hope do we have? Maybe this: spiritual clarity is not a destination. It's a lifelong unfolding.

Richard Rohr expresses it simply: "Spirituality is about seeing. Sin is about blindness." We rarely see things as they truly are. We see them through the lens of our fears, our wounds, our assumptions. And so Lent becomes an invitation, not only to see more clearly, but to let ourselves be seen by God. Through prayer, fasting, and acts of love, we peel away the layers that cloud our vision. We begin to see the sacredness of others. We soften toward those we struggle with. Seeing clearly leads us to living differently. We start to notice God in the places we never thought to look.

The same Jesus who opened the eyes of a man who had never once seen light can open ours too. He remains the fountain for our thirst and the light in our darkness. And when His grace finally breaks through, we, too, can say: "I can see and I believe in God."

My dear friends, Jesus touched the blind man's eyes then; He touches ours now in the sacraments. He comes to heal us, to restore us, and to let His light break through the places we keep hidden. Lord, open our eyes and we shall see. Amen

Living Museum at St. Anthony of Padua School

Our students recently brought history to life during the school's Living Museum, portraying influential African American figures who have made a lasting impact on our world. Students researched and presented notable individuals such as **Rosa Parks**, as well as **Black Catholic saints, inventors, and other important leaders**.

Financial Aid Process and Eligibility

To maximize affordability, families desiring financial aid are required to:

- Apply promptly to the ESTF program (Empowerment Scholarship for Educational Choice) and St. Anthony of Padua FACTS Grant & Aid to assess eligibility. Funds are likely to be unavailable after March 1, 2026.
- Provide verification of ESTF award or waitlist status to the school.
- School-based aid covers only the need exceeding the \$7,634 ESTF scholarship amount, based solely on financial need—not allocation choices.
- Families without an ESTF award (with waitlist verification) remain eligible for tuition discounts and potential school-based aid, though funds are limited and not guaranteed.
